The primary emphasis of this course is on practical strategies and techniques for promoting the successful integration of primary level pupils who have diverse special education needs into regular education schools and classrooms. The students are also introduced to a rationale for mainstreaming; administrative issues that surround mainstreaming programs; basic principles of behavior management and classroom organization; methods for promoting social interaction between pupils who have disabilities and their nonhandicapped peers; the roles of special and regular education teachers in mainstream programs; and integration strategies for parents.
