A year ago, the two courses, Phil 451 (Kant), and Phil 452 (19th Century European Philosophy), were approved by FACC. These courses were not forwarded to SCUS at that time but were retained in your office pending an explanation of the fact that they are to be 4 credit courses.

They are, of course, to be taught in seminar meetings 4 hours a week, and the vector clearly reflects this. But this still leaves the question as to why they are being offered for four hours rather than three. The simple fact of the matter is that the amount of material available; and worth studying, on Kant is so vast that at other universities Kant courses are often year-long courses. We try very hard in this department not to have to offer courses spread over two semesters, and so will try to teach Kant in one semester. But we feel that we cannot do so adequately in only three hours. The same situation applies in the other case as well, where we are trying to cover several philosophers — including Hegel, Nietzsche, Kierkegaard — any of whom could warrant a semester-long course on his own. Again, then, four hours seems minimal.

The department plans to offer these courses in 87-1 and 87-3 respectively, and so would like them listed in the 86 Calendar.

Justification

Phil. 452 (Kant and the Nineteenth Century) has been taught three times over the last six years. Each time a majority of students complained that there was simply too much material packed into this course, even at four credit/contact hours. Because of the great complexity of the works of Kant, Hegel, and other figures in this period, it is clearly a better idea (in hindsight, unfortunately) to devote one course to Kant and another to the study of one or two subsequent philosophers. In addition, an understanding of Kant is absolutely essential for understanding Hegel, Schopenhauer, Marx, Nietzsche, or Kierkegaard. A thorough understanding of Kant is also important for studying the various romantic and positivist movements of the Nineteenth Century. It is simply impossible to gain suffient knowledge of Kant's transcendental idealism in the six or seven weeks now allotted in Phil. 452. It was originally thought that a survey of <u>The Critique of Pure Reason</u> would be possible within that time, but this was wrong. Finally, Kant is one of the most important philosophers of the modern period and work --by contemporary philosophers—both european and anglo-american-- presupposes more than just passing familiarity with his works.

A separate course for Nineteenth Century European philosophy would usually be devoted to the work of Hegel and perhaps one other figure (such as Schopenhauer or Nietzsche as critics of absolute This is currently a primary research area for Professor Tietz. This course would have the new Kant course as a prerequisite and would therefore be able to proceed directly to the works of major subsequent figures with little review. There is renewed interest in major intellectual figures such as Hegel, Schopenhauer, Nietzsche, and Wagner because of their extremely interesting and important views about the self, society, art, knowledge, metaphysics, and value. Twentieth Century figures seemingly diverse as Michel Foucault, Martin Heidegger, John Dewey, and Ludwig Wittgenstein all acknowledge this debt to the Nineteenth Century and much of what they have to say can be traced to influences from that period.

Summary of Proposal

To divide the Present Phil. 452-4 (Kant and the Nineteenth Century) into two courses: Phil. 451-4 (Kant) and the retitled Phil. 452-4, Nineteenth Century European Philosophy.
